Police Scotland launch *THAT GUY* campaign

Men must take responsibility for ending sexual violence by changing their attitudes and behaviour towards women as well as challenging those of their peers.

Police Scotland's latest sexual crime prevention campaign continues to put the cause of sexual offending where it belongs – with men.

The **THAT** GUY campaign builds on previous Police Scotland #GetConsent campaigns, targeting men aged 18–35 years who are most likely to commit sexual offences.

Its aim is to urge men to take responsibility for their actions and language to help affect a culture change to tackle sexual crime against women.

The campaign features a new advert which will run on several online platforms, including social media.

Launching the campaign, Deputy Chief Constable Malcolm Graham said:

"It's time that we men reflected on our own behaviours and attitudes – and those of our friends, family and colleagues - towards women in order to prevent rape, sexual assault and harassment.

"We want all women to be free to live their lives without worrying about their safety.

"Women are not responsible for the sexual offences committed against them and should be able to go about their daily lives without worrying about being sexually harassed, assaulted or raped.

"It's up to men to step up, to not be 'that guy' and to stop sexual offending before it starts."

Recent crimes/issues in the area:

Assessment period 21/11/21 – 21/12/21

Police dealt with 114 calls within the Kirriemuir area and 488 in Forfar area during this period.

There have been 60 crimes subsequently recorded in this period for Forfar and Kirriemuir. (A new crime recording system has been introduced recently so data is still being updated and as such final figures may vary)

Group 1 - Crimes of violence, including murder, rape, extortion, serious assault, robbery – (3)

Group 2 - Sexual Crimes – (0)

Group 3 - Crimes of Dishonesty – (16)

Group 4 – Fire Raising, Vandalism, Malicious Mischief, Reckless Conduct – (3)

Group 5 – Other Crimes including Breach of Bail, Weapons, Drugs offences – (4)

Group 6 – Miscellaneous Crimes including Assaults, Police Assaults, Threatening behaviour, Stalking, - (31)

Group 7 – Road Traffic Offences – (3)

Kirriemuir Community Council raised a concern with Police regarding youths delivering newspapers without adequate lighting on their cycles. In response, a member of the CPT visited all the newsagents in Kirriemuir and gave appropriate advice and gained their assistance to ensure that all persons delivering papers are provided with lights. The Kirriemuir Community Council offered to pay for lights to assist with road safety. We appreciate their kind offer and this has been communicated with the newsagents who also appreciated this and agreed to contact the CC should this be needed in future. We are to follow this up across Angus with an operation to promote road safety for all people delivering newspapers.
